Little did Jeffersonville area residents know that the closing was just the beginning of what appears to be the end of major chain restaurants in the locally-dominated food scene.

In March, Bristol Bar & Grille also closed. the go-to restaurant for guests of the Sheraton

at our downtown, Highlands and East restaurants," the Bristol ownership group said in a statement to the Courier-Journal.

While some residents may be wondering why so many major restaurants have been closing in the downtown area, the answer appears simple: locally-owned businesses, not franchises, are dominating.

Over the past year, downtown Jeffersonville has become the hot spot for all things, including food, clothing, and entertainment/recreation.

The local boom began in May of 2014, with the opening of the Big Four Bridge, available for walkers and cyclists to walk from Jeffersonville to the waterfront in Louisville. Later in the year came The Red Yeti, the start of many locally-owned restaurants.
